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FROM THE BOARD: Hello Starlight Residents:

Here it is June already. Where does the time go?

We have a couple of items that are important and we want to share them with all of you. We finalized the agreement with ELS and they have sent letters to all the affected residents notifying them of their new rent increase (a decrease in the amount of the base rent). As we noted in our May issue, there was a decrease and a Long-Term Agreement (LTA) was signed. We also have a letter from Leslie Taylor-Rharbi, Vice President at ELS, that states all of the capital improvements that will be done in the next few months. This letter of commitment was also part of our negotiations. We have captured all the items in writing and they are currently working on obtaining bids from different vendors.

Another area that has improved is that of Security and Towing, these two services are now working closely together and are towing illegally parked cars. Again, we do not want to see anyone's car towed, but if you or your guest are not parked properly, chances are those cars will be towed at owner's expense. So, please follow the parking rules and make sure your guest are parked in the appropriate areas. Remember, if you have a guest staying over, go to the office and get a guest pass for your visitor. A reminder to all: parking on Wild Horse is until dusk, if you are parked after that time your car (s) will be towed.

On another note, Hurricane season begins June 1st, please plan accordingly. Have the location of the nearest shelter and keep the proper supplies needed like batteries for flashlights, water and nonperishable foods in your hurricane kit in case we lose power. Most important, if you take medication, make sure you have enough handy. These items should last for two to three days, and should be according to how many individuals are in

your household. For those with disabilities, medical or mobility problems, you can always register with the Orange County Special Needs Program. If a hurricane is approaching the area, they will make sure to pick you up and take you to a shelter where you will be safe and provided with whatever medical needs you may require. You can register by calling 407-836-9319. Remember, in these situations, preparation is key.

Another important item we all need to cooperate with is our current drought situation. Please water your lawn on your designated days only. Water is a precious commodity and many times we take it for granted. Please note the days you are allowed to water your lawn. During April through November, odd numbered addresses should water only on Wednesdays and Saturdays and those with even numbered addresses should water only on Thursdays and Sundays.

One last item, we have been experiencing some vandalism in our community, apparently not from the inside, but from outside vandals. We urge you to report any suspicious activity, by calling our security company, Rattlesnake Security at 407-545-1464 or by calling 911.

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














EXTERIOR MODIFICATION PROCEDURES

TO YOUR HEALTH: The In And Out of FoodBy Ron Speener



The other day I baked bread. Not so much that I needed it, but I love the smell! And the first slice, still a little warm, with real butter (not the imitation from a squeeze bottle) melting into the

crevasses and maybe some raspberry jam spread thick enough to drip over the sides, is one of the great simple pleasures. It is not only the smell and taste of oven-fresh bread, but also the memory of my grandmother baking it in her kitchen. The smell and taste of food are pleasures that not only nourish the body but also feed the soul. As we age, sadly, our ability to smell and taste decline. In fact, the entire system that processes food changes, so in three parts over the next several months, I will discuss how we process food from the *in through* the *out*.

Part 1: IN-Smell and Taste

The taste of coffee and chocolate is mostly in the smell. Without the aromas from coffee or melting chocolate, these foods would be bitter and unappealing. There is a very close relationship between taste and smell. The combination of taste and smell is called flavor. Without smell, food tastes bland. We have about 350 olfactory receptors, which can detect about 10,000 different odors. Taste and smell combine in the back of our throat; some of the smell surges forward and activates some taste buds. By the age of 70, smell is in major decline, and by 80, 75% of us have major impairment of smell.

The exact causes of the decline in the sense of smell are not fully known. It seems that the nerves that detect smell, which regenerate throughout our younger years stop regenerating, so we detect fewer smells. Smoking, medications and diseases also affect our sense of smell. Decline in smell, besides memory, is one of the first losses associated with Alzheimer's disease.

Besides a decline in smell as we age, the ability to discern tastes declines. Scientists now say we have five major flavors we detect: sweet, bitter, salty, sour and umami (which is meaty or fatty flavors). These flavors are primarily detected by the taste buds and enhanced by smell. We are born with about 9,000 taste buds, but they decline in both number and size. Contrary to what was originally believed, the ability to detect these flavors is not isolated to areas of the tongue but spread across the tongue with some areas having more of a concentration.

Like with smell, scientists are not totally sure why taste sensitivity declines over the years. There is some evidence that the number of taste buds decline with age. Two other factors also affect decline in the flavor of food with age. Chewing is an important mechanism for not only reducing food to a pulp before it reaches the stomach. It also releases flavor from the food. If we have few teeth or poor dentures, the food does not get ground up enough to release flavor. The second important factor is the decline in saliva.

Saliva has several important functions. It moistens food so it is easier to swallow. It fights germs in the mouth and protects teeth and gums. It also has enzymes that break down foods, so they will be more easily digested. In the process of breaking down food, the enzymes release flavor. With less saliva and less flavor, we will not enjoy what we eat.

The decline in smell and taste has a direct impact on our eating enjoyment and health. If food tastes flat, we eat less or choose foods with more salt or sugar. What can be done? We need to eat and we want to enjoy our food:

- Increase saliva production by drinking water or suck on a sugar-free lemon drop before the meal
- We also 'eat' with our eyes, so make the food look appetizing
- o Have foods with texture—chunky applesauce.
- Take time to chew—this allows more time for the flavor to hit the tongue
- Serve food at the right temperature—warm food enhance aroma
- Flavor with herbs and spices.

Use to increase sweetness without boldness without salt sugar

- Vanilla
 Basil, cilantro and oregano
 Cardamom
 Nutmeg
 Cumin
- GingerRosemaryMintFennel
- MintCaraway, anise,and corianderFennelSage
- TurmericCayenne pepperGarlic and onion
 - Cinnamon o Garlic and onion

That morning cup of coffee with a slice of fresh bread may not be as flavorful as it was twenty years ago, but it does not mean it is any less enjoyable. Take extra time to smell deeply, to chew slowly, and to feed the soul.

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




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GOLF CARTS



Golf carts can cost thousands of dollars and a specialized policy can help protect your investment. When considering insurance for your golf cart, it's important that you look at the benefits of a policy that is specifically designed for golf carts rather than an endorsement on a homeowners policy. Make sure things like theft and liability are covered.

More coverage equals more value. Here is a summary of valuable standard and optional coverages:

- Collision coverage protects your golf cart in the event of damage caused by collisions with things like other vehicles, trees or utility poles, regardless of fault.
- Other Than Collision coverage provides coverage for other kinds of damage to the golf cart, such as fire, theft, flood or vandalism.
- Liability coverage for third-party injury and property damage claims resulting from an accident involving the covered golf cart.
- Medical Payments provides primary coverage for medical bills incurred for injuries resulting from a motor vehicle accident.
- Annual Policies mean year-round coverage with no lay-up period, whenever you want to take a spin in your golf cart, you're covered. No extra phone calls, no hassles!
- Optional coverage for Transport Trailers covers trailers used to transport the insured golf cart. This optional physical damage coverage is an excellent choice for trailers valued at up to \$7,500.







